Pastor's Ponderings

"Speak out for those who cannot speak, for the rights of all the destitute. Speak out, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy." Proverbs 31:8-9

This Old Testament quote from Proverbs is a prequel for Jesus' ministry and His calling for his followers. The church and its people cannot be silent when people do not have a voice, or when people's voices have been taken away. This quote is written by King Lemuel, who is reporting what his mother taught him. (Mom's are smart!)

People who are destitute are those without necessities of life. People who do not have a voice are people dismissed or not recognized in society. The poor and needy represent the majority+ in the world. Thus, we include in our ministry people who are struggling in our local community and throughout the world. Our support for World Hunger and local food pantries are just a small example. It can be overwhelming, but it is our calling to continue to care for others: the refugee and immigrant, the children who are on the streets, the hungry in different countries, LGBTQIA+ people in this country and around the world who are being hurt and mistreated, the addicts, the widows, the people without health care, the mentally ill, the incarcerated, the elderly, the ill and suffering and so many more. Our job doesn't end with Jesus' salvation for us. It begins with that and continues all our lives as we are called to be the body of Christ in the World. Christianity to me has always been an outward looking, selfless calling. In 2025 together we can continue to impact the people Jesus' calls us to impact.


A message from Pastor Fred and Anne:

Another commitment of the ELCA, alongside Global Mission.

"God is our refuge and strength," - Psalm 46:1

AMMPARO is a holistic, whole church commitment by the ELCA, as a church in the world, to accompany migrant families today and in the future.

The word "amparo" in Spanish means the protection of a living creature from suffering or damage. The ELCA's strategy to Accompanying Migrants with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities (AMMPARO) was envisioned after witnessing the plight of children who are forced to flee their communities because of complex and interrelated reasons, including chronic violence, poverty, environmental displacement and lack of opportunities in El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala. Due to our

connection to companion churches in the region, including companion synod relationships, and existing ministries in the U.S., the ELCA is well-positioned to help ensure that these vulnerable children are protected. In a holistic, whole church response that connects international and US outcomes, the ELCA has developed this strategy based on the following commitments:


- Uphold and guarantee basic human rights and safety of migrant children and their families;
- Address the drivers of migration around the world and the treatment of migrants in transit;
- Work toward just and humane policies affecting migrants in and outside the U.S.;
 and
- Engage as a church body with all of its companions, affiliates and partners to respond to the migration situation and its causes and to advocate for migrant children and their families.

As siblings in Christ, the ELCA is called to bear witness to the conditions affecting so many communities and to work to find solutions that will acknowledge the humanity in all of God's children. Join us in making a difference in the lives of vulnerable children and families.


Why is an invitation to mercy so controversial?

"As we continue our commitment to justice and accompaniment, practicing a G.R.A.C.E. Mindset, it is essential to recognize the interconnected realities shaping those impacted by immigration policies. Immigration justice intersects with racial equity, economic justice, and gender justice. Embracing this intersectional lens in the coming months allows us to:

- Address systemic inequalities by amplifying the voices of immigrants facing compounded challenges.
- Engage intersectional advocacy with partners work-

ing across these areas.

- Resource our congregations with tools to understand the broader social systems impacting immigrant communities."
- ..."Our diversity encompasses a variety of ethnicities, cultures, identities, and expressions, including sex, gender, and sexuality. Our church is committed to advocating for and supporting laws, policies, and practices that respect diverse bodies, including people who are transgender and non-binary, and rejecting those which discriminate, objectify, or devalue. Founded by immigrants, this church "advocates for and supports legal reforms, humane policies, and adequate services for migrants, immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers, especially those who experience intersecting forms of oppression." (ELCA Faith, Sexism, and Justice). Advocacy is what love for our neighbors looks like. We join together to stand with who are afraid, speaking a word of mercy, working together for freedom, dignity, and equity for all."



Presiding Bishop Eaton Issues Pastoral Message on Executive Orders



January 28, 2025

"When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the native-born among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:33-34).

Dear church,

I write to you today with grave concern. Over the past few days, ELCA leaders and ministry partners have shared with me the immediate impacts of recent executive orders

focused on immigration. I have heard about families frightened of being torn apart and from congregations fearful that their churches can no longer offer safety or support to their immigrant neighbors. I have heard from faith partners ordered to stop services to refugees and from businesses upended by workforce disruptions.

Many of us in the ELCA come from immigrant peoples. As Lutherans, we have a long tradition of hospitality, dating back to the end of World War II, of helping displaced Lutheran refugees, assisting subsequent refugee groups and welcoming new immigrants. Our church has long called for compassionate, just and wise immigration reform. ("Toward Compassionate, Just and Wise Immigration Reform" social policy resolution).

Today, recent immigrants, refugees, asylum-seekers and displaced people are members of our congregations, communities and leadership. The presence of newcomers heightens our awareness of issues of relevance to the church so we can take part in faithful deliberation on public policies, like the ones that have come out in recent days. Our church's grave concerns grow out of these experiences with the people being affected.

From these experiences, people in our church have learned that the decision to leave one's home country is not made lightly. Many have arrived fleeing persecution because of how they worship, their political views, or their race and nationality. Political instability, environmental catastrophes and lack of opportunities have also compelled many to seek a more dignified life. Out of our own Lutheran experience of knowing many refugees, we have long stood against exclusionary attitudes and policies toward successive newcomers.

Among the policy changes to which our church's social teaching objects include:

- Orders to suspend all refugee resettlement.
- · New and sweeping enforcement priorities.
- The summons of military personnel to the border.
- The decision to revoke special guidance regarding enforcement activity at or near sacred or protected places.

Keeping communities safe and supporting the well-being of all people is a goal shared by the ELCA. Yet it's worth naming that these executive actions are increasing fear and division within our society. Some people, including U.S. citizens, are alarmed about immigration enforcement at churches, schools and playgrounds. Some are afraid to seek care at hospitals or to access essential services.

The ELCA supports the view that nations have the responsibility to protect their borders and safeguard their communities. However, these policies must cause "neither undue repercussions within immigrant communities nor bias against them" ("Immigration" social message, page 7). Just policies include recognition of the humanity of immigrants without status, respect for the dignity of those at the border and refuge for displaced people.

The Scriptures are clear. We are called to see anew the image of God in our immigrant neighbors. Following God's call in Leviticus 19 that is echoed throughout Scripture, the time is now.

It is my sincere hope as bishop that various harmful actions will be reconsidered. It is my fervent prayer that we, as church together, will be bold in our witness and actions. ELCA churchwide ministries will continue to provide resources to protect the most vulnerable among us.

Let us together join in:

- A Call to Prayer alongside and for immigrants and sojourners, our communities and for our leaders, that they will act wisely and justly, protect all people and not cause harm.
- A Call to Learning, using resources such as the ELCA social message "Immigration"; the ELCA's strategy for Accompanying Migrants with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities (AMMPARO), including <u>"Know Your Rights"</u> information; and companion resources from <u>Global Refuge</u> (formerly Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) and <u>Church World Service</u> on the policy changes. Join ELCA AMMPARO and Global Refuge for a webinar, "What Now—Resources for Faith Communities after Executive Orders," on Thursday, Jan. 30, 4-5 p.m. Eastern time. Registration is required. Register here.
- A Call to Personal Witness by speaking out against rhetoric that dehumanizes and demonizes anyone made in the image of God, and by promoting accurate information about neighbors and issues of public concern, in the spirit of the <u>Conference of Bishops statement</u> on the need to speak the truth.
- A Call to Public Witness, using the resources of ELCA AMMPARO, <u>ELCA Witness in Society</u> and State Public Policy Offices, and joining with our ecumenical partners as we offer faithful, direct witness to government.

As a <u>sanctuary denomination</u>, the ELCA proclaims walking with immigrants as a matter of faithfulness. The ELCA does not call for activity contrary to the law but for congregations, leaders and individuals to explore resources addressing how to interpret this memorial to their own contexts. Most of all, I encourage all to discern together how to live our faith, excluding none from God's overflowing love.

God calls us to welcome the stranger and love the sojourner as we love ourselves. I pray for God's grace to increase understanding of and mercy toward immigrants in these days.
